## Babies, Businesses, and Benefits Threatened by Republicans

No one is spared from the pain of Donald Trump's tariffs and economic chaos. Even after the President temporarily lowered tariffs from a stratospheric 145%, Yale Budget Lab <u>calculates</u> that consumers are facing the highest average tariff rate since the 1930s. ### Babies Get Less, You Pay More

Trump targets toy manufacturers:
